A very challenging year but our journey to economic independence continues!

It's been said that a week is a long time in politics and as for the last year, it's taken up much of our creative energies to ward off the city mayor's determined and unmerited attacks on our Centre. In his blatant quest to bankrupt Highfields Community Association, it seems he's not averse to victimising the wider communities in Highfields through his actions on several service related developments,

Since gaining community governance status in December 2010, our:

- 1. Turnover has increased by 360%
- 2. Expenditure has increased by 494 % (inclusive of a one-off pension deficit payment)
- 3. Staff team has increased by 40%
- 4. Over 400,000 users in 4 years (2011 2014) & exceeded all contractual targets
- 5. Open to the public 7 days per week over 326 days per year
- 6. Provided 5000 activity sessions in 2014, averaging 16 people per session
- 7. Member of 5 successful, externally funded service consortiums
- 8. Highfields Centre's pioneering community cohesion work resulted in it championing 'Celebrating Diversity and Unity in the Community' long before it became common parlance in both local and national discourse and reflected in both its staffing and usage figures, with HCA staff comprising last year of 59% Asian, 21% African/Caribbean, 12% White and 8% Other and reflected in its people usage pattern, with 73% Asian, 16% African/Caribbean, 4% White and 7% Other
- 9. 91% of our users said HCA's services were excellent to good
- 10. 98% of our users said they would continue to use HCA's services
- 11. 97% of our users said they'd recommend our services to their friends, family, etc
- 12. Gained national accreditation through the achievement of the Social Enterprise Mark, Investors in People, Matrix, Advice Quality Standard and other national kite marks

Just a fraction of the statistics on page 1 would suggest a remarkable set of achievements to be celebrated and utilised as a benchmark for equivalent developments to be effected elsewhere in this city but as we now know, it's not a view shared by the city mayor!

His dictatorial actions have resulted in not only a £510,000 cut in the Centre's budget but more importantly, the removal and jeopardising of well established pre-school and adult learning services in this area. The level of the reductions effected has meant us having to restructure our operation to ensure not only a continued and meaningful level of service provision (see inside pages) but also, the Centre's ongoing viability.

The understanding and support of our staff, service users, Governing Body and supporters from near and far has made this possible and a big thanks to you for the same!

Your support over the past few months has been as invaluable as your support over our 13 year journey to raise £5 million pounds, redevelop the old Centre and bring it under community governance and we'll look forward to receiving that ongoing support over the next phase of our Centre and our communities' development.

Welfare Rights Adviser's Action Saves Client £4000 Appeal Charges!

A client had applied for a UK resident's card as an Indian national. His wife is working and holds Portuguese nationality. All the necessary paperwork was submitted by the husband to support his application. This included his wife's wage slips, bank statements and other supporting statements.

The Home Office refused the application as it stated that that it did not believe that the wife was working. It was claimed that they had made various attempts to contact the company over the phone but that there was no response. It was further claimed that they had also undertaken a Google search of the company name but could not find anything.

Our Advice Officer asked for a re-consideration of the application. She also pointed out that that there are two factories at the same address on different floors. It was also made known that the factory where the wife works is registered with Companies House and she had sent them the Company Registration number. Having sent the letter to the Home Office in January '15, there was no reply by March '15. Our Advice Officer called the Home Office to check on progress and was informed that it was not sure whether the compliance team was going to look into it.

It was deemed necessary by our Advice Officer to make a formal complaint as the Home Office had charged £55 and yet no searches had been carried out. The Home Office back tracked and issued our client with his visa. They also apologised for the delay in the reconsideration taking place and for not meeting our expectations on this occasion.

If our Advice Officer had left this case unchallenged, then our client would have had to Appeal against the decision. This would have cost £3000 to £4000 for a solicitor and could have taken up to 8 months for the Appeal to be heard. During that time, the client would not have been able to work and it would have had damaging repercussions on the whole family.

SPORTS

ELDERS' GROUP – The sports team continue to work with the elder's group Io help improve their daily lives through a programme of gentle exercise and social activity on a weekly basis. This programme will be increased to 3 days a week from October and all enquiries are welcome.



NEW SESSIONS -The sports team have welcomed Leicester City Football & Leicestershire/ Rutland Cricket Club who both run satellite clubs from the Centre on a weekly basis.

SPORTS PROGRAMME – The Centre runs regular weekly sessions of Badminton, Table-Tennis, Football (5 to 12 years) and Basket Ball - all enquires welcome.

FITNESS SUITE – The Centre's Gym & Sauna open daily with sessions for women only, as well as mixed sessions. All enquires are welcome.

From Unemployment to Employment!

From September to December 2014, we delivered a Level 2 Youth Work course accredited through Aim Awards. Thirteen Talent Match young people who were unemployed for 12 months or more registered onto the course. Eleven young people completed the course and gained the Level 2 qualification. Ten of the young people either gained employment or set up their own enterprise within a month of completing this course. The course not only provides you with a qualification to work with young people but also develops you as an individual and helps you realise your true potential.

Talent Match Highfields

We are in our 2nd year of delivering this new programme and very proud of our achievements so far, as we have exceeded our programme targets.

Efaz Ahmed is one of the many young people who have been supported by this programme and here's his story: Before Talent Match, I was unemployed with not many qualifications but voluntarily running a football academy for boys aged 5-14. Talent Match staff at Highfields Centre provided me with the information and support to access various courses such as Get Started delivered by the Prince's Trust and Highfields Centre's Level 2 Youth Work course. Currently, I have 10 qualifications and have gained employment through the Step Up programme. My aim is to use sports to help young people to develop interpersonal and transferable skills to prepare them for the future. I hope to bring out the best in young people, motivate them and help them build resilience. Celebration of Successes at

Adult Certificate Presentation Evening 2015

We have been proudly celebrating our adult learners' successes for over thirty years and this year's event was attended by 150 learners on 7th August.

Priya Thamotheram provided a short introduction and welcome and spoke of the long tradition spanning over 30 years of adult learning provision at Highfields Centre. He said the Centre is committed to providing adult learning provision and will be seeking funding opportunities to develop new programmes at the Centre over the coming months.

Aiyub Zamakda who manages HC's adult learning provision spoke about the importance of lifelong learning and the contribution it makes to peoples' lives. He mentioned key benefits of learning to include: personal development, acquisition of skills and knowledge relevant for employment, developing self confidence, health benefits, helping people to make informed decision in their lives and acquiring new skills, so that people can increase their independence. Highfields Centre had over 550 enrolments over the last year, with nearly 10,000 learners and over 1,000 classes and with a retention and success rate of 95 per cent!.

The Adult Services department continues to provide a valuable service aimed at the unemployed and those seeking to enter the labour market and in spite of the Council's funding cuts, the Centre is still providing

Advice Services to help people access benefits, housing, debt, immigration and general advice.

Rafique Patel, Chair of Highfields Business Association and a guest presenter said: "It is absolutely fantastic to see you learning and commend you all especially with your responsibilities."

Jon Ashworth MP gave out the certificates and congratulated each and every learner for their efforts. He commented: "I am deeply proud of you, proud of the staff, tonight's your night, enjoy it" and in recognising the work of the Centre and its staff, Jon gave his assurance to support the Highfields Centre. He said "If Highfields Centre didn't exist; we'd have to invent one!"

The 2015 Student of the Year Award was presented to Khatija Mahomed, an ESOL learner who has shown tremendous commitment and dedication over the last year and on a range of criteria, she had scored the highest marks to warrant this year's award.

For the third consecutive year, we provided the 2015 Business Awards, with the New Business of the Year award presented to Mumtaz Ahmed from Elegance Beauty. In the Creative Business of the Year category, the award was presented to Ziyaad Lorgat from Firdose Limited.



In her closing remarks to learners, Dr Iris Lightfoote, a guest presenter, Chief Executive of The Race Equality Centre and Interim HCA Chair said: "We need to continue to work together towards our aims. Help us to come together, moving forward positively and come back next year."

Highfields Our Place - Going Further!

Highfields Our Place aims to give local people more power over local services and budgets in our neighbourhoods, aligning these with the other resources that the community can bring. In recognition that we share many similar problems with fellow communities, Highfields led a partnership of Leicester's 3 Our Place projects called `Going Further` that included Saffron Resource Centre in the South of the City and Cooke-e Learning and Beaumont Lodge Community Association in the North.

We are working together to plan and then provide a Community Wi-Fi service that could give vital on-line access to everyone in our community that wants it at a price that people can afford. With Government forcing all applications for support on-line, yet with multi-national web based services being expensive, this community Wi-Fi project could be an essential life-line for many in Highfields and beyond.

Building on Highfields leading role in Our Place, and in recognition of the fundamental problems that many people have to face, Highfields Centre was elected by nine advice service providing community organisations from across the city to lead on a £5.2 million European Union bid for resources to help those furthest from employment secure work, including self-employment. Called Maximising Economic Potential, the project includes Highfields Centre, The Race Equality Centre, Shama Women's Centre, Bangladesh Youth and Cultural Shomiti, Somali Development Services and Pakistan Youth and Community Association. The support our centres` would give would be intensive and include advocacy that is fighting vulnerable local people's corners against unfairness, inequality and unhelpful bureaucracy.

Finally, and having recognised the hopelessness caused for many people being in work yet still in poverty, Highfields Centre along with our local partners is working with the International Ethical Trading Initiative to support those trapped in illegal working conditions.

Business Support

FIRDOSE - is a new UK based brand aimed at creating luxury leather cases for the holy Qur'an. The idea for Firdose came 12 months ago in September 2013, whilst collecting my children from evening Arabic classes; I noticed many were carrying their copy of the holy book with no external cover to protect it from the elements, though some did have a cover.

I researched online and in local Islamic shops what was on the market and found there was only a one size fits all option (there are various sizes of the Qur'an (holy book)) mainly aimed at children.

I set apart designing a prototype based on a heritage design traditionally produced from cloth, and after researching different materials found leather to be the perfect choice, aimed at an adult market. I have also produced a more vibrant range for children from wool felt. I needed funding to get the product to market and contacted Highfields Centre. Alfred Bawak (Business Adviser) helped me to put a business plan together and successfully applied for the Enterprising Leicester project. Alfred was instrumental in listening & understanding what our business was trying to achieve & then he gave valuable advice accordingly & help with completing the application form for the Enterprising Leicester grant. His help & support was very valuable as he helped Firdose acquire the grant for key essentials when starting a business ie a computer & marketing & product materials. I would definitely recommend Highfields Centre's Business Support service to anybody who is seeking to start or expand a business, as Alfred is a very helpful &

CLEAR SKIN – I (Mumtaz Ahmed) have been involved in hair and beauty for the past 13 years. Building from past experience, I wanted to create an ambience of peace and tranquillity, from a home based salon offering customers various beauty treatments from facials, waxing, threading, make up and IPL laser treatments, as there's a gap in the market with people now more conscious than ever before of their appearance and there is not enough supply to keep up with the demand for IPL laser treatment in my targeted

knowledgeable individual.

I needed funding to help source the machine. On Cllr Abdul Osman's recommendation, I contacted Highfields Centre for assistance.

I would like to say a Big Thank you to Alfred for his reliable and prompt service that he offered. From the onset, he kept me well informed, never let me down with arranged meetings or agreed schedules when creating my Business Plan which I could never have completed without his constant support. He gave me the confidence to turn my dream in to a reality

Without a clear business plan I would not have been able to apply for an interest free loan. My business plan was extremely beneficial to the set up of ELEGANCE Beauty Room, as without it I could not have obtained the funding required. With Alfred's help, we created a fantastic business plan which not only gave creditors an insight into my estimated income but also helped me establish realistic amount of clients I will have to treat to establish my goal. I have been granted a £15,000 interest free loan by the Sir Thomas White Charity and my objective was achieved! I've recommended Alfred to many others and will always be thankful to him for helping me to turn a thought into a reality. I am extremely pleased with the help and support received. I would also like to thank Cllr Abdul Osman who provided me with Highfields Centre's details at a New Business seminar, as I wasn't aware this service was available so close to home.

Activities for Young People

The youth team have had an extremely busy year providing a range of informal educational activities and opportunities to help young people learn more about themselves and the community they live in. Each term, young people were encouraged to get involved in planning their chosen activities which included:

- Educational trips

Each session creatively incorporated elements of the youth work curriculum and developing young people's knowledge, skills and attitudes.

Highfields Food Bank - Helping to Ease Hardship

Many food bank clients are low income families hit by a crisis that is not their fault such as redundancy, reduced working hours or an unexpected bill for gas or electricity. Others are experiencing hardship because of benefits sanctions, delays with payment, facing debt issues or illness.

Highfields Food Bank was established with the support of our local MP Jon Ashworth over a year ago to help local people experiencing hardship as a result of welfare reform changes. The Race Equality Centre has, in partnership with Highfields Centre, organised and run the Food Bank. The staff and volunteers from both these organisations have enabled this much needed service to be provided on a bi-weekly basis.

Non-perishable food is donated by local people, schools and agencies. We have also received limited funding from the Spinney Hills Ward Committee and faith and trade union groups. Volunteers from all backgrounds help to run the food bank by packing, sorting and distributing food.

We are particularly grateful to the children, parents and staff from Charnwood Primary School who have very recently collected and donated food. Their School Assembly on the theme of Eid was well organised and the children who took part showed great skills and communication abilities in speaking to a

large audience. The children's contribution to the collection of food is to be commended.

Highfields Food Bank provides basic emergency food items to anybody who:

- Lives either in Spinney Hills Ward or in the Highfields area (bounded by London Road, Evington Road, St Saviours, Vulcan Road, Nedham Street and the Midland Mainline) and,
- Is experiencing immediate or urgent financial hardship due, for example, to a reduction in income caused by the impact of austerity measures or restructuring of welfare benefits.
